



MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Recently, I had coffee with a long-time community supporter. Among our many topics of conversation, she said that when she was a little girl, she and her friend would run out to the fields in the summer and lay on the ground, watching the ladybugs crawl around, marveling at how big they must seem to the tiny insects. Then she and her friend would flop over and stare up at the sky, watching the clouds scuttle by, feeling small themselves. She said, "Every kid, everybody needs that. To touch the ground and see ourselves differently."

She continued: "This is what motivates me."

I knew perfectly well what she meant. It is, after all, what brought me to the Columbia Slough Watershed Council this past January.

I am honored to be part of this long-standing community group and proud of what we do; creating opportunities for people to study bugs, get their hands dirty planting trees, bike to hidden green spaces, or dip a paddle in the Slough.

A lot happens around here, as I learned within my first week on the job, and you will see in this report. In the coming pages, you will learn just a few of our many achievements during July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019, from cleaning up our waterways, to teaching kids about groundwater, and taking grownups on their very first canoe trips.

As always, there is more work to do. Not just addressing legacy industrial pollutants but also new contaminants we are just beginning to understand, and the vexing challenges of a warming climate, social injustices, and growing economic disparities.

It is one reason that we plan to undertake strategic planning in the next year. We will look at this place from fresh angles and our strategies from different frames of reference. This inquiry will be rooted in the immutable belief that of all the many ways our world may change, one's personal change in perspective is a powerful experience, essential to environmental stewardship.

Whether we are hauling trash out by boat, prowling for owl sightings, or talking about how the Council can best address our watershed's toughest challenges, I hope you will be a part of it.

There is a lot to discover about ourselves in the Columbia Slough Watershed.






WE BRING PEOPLE AND NATURE TOGETHER

Our Outreach and Events program provides free opportunities for individuals and groups to learn about and enjoy our watershed.

In 2018-19, we hosted over 20 free community events, workshops, and festivals with nearly two thousand participants. From biking and birding, to canoeing and clean-ups, there is something for all ages and abilities in the Columbia Slough watershed.

THE SLOUGH IS FOR EVERYONE

From seasoned paddlers to firsttimers, we equip everyone with the gear and skills they need to boat on the Columbia Slough by providing free boats, life vests and training at all of our community paddles. This year, we strove to make our annual Columbia Slough Regatta more accessible to community members from culturally specific groups by providing interpretation services and reserving 100 spaces for members of communities who have not historically connected with Council events. including immigrant and refugee communities.

WE TEACH THE NEXT GENERATION

Our Education program, known as Slough School, creates fun, science-based, and hands-on lessons for K-12 students to learn the history and ecology of the Columbia Slough watershed. In the classroom and out in the field, students explore the living and nonliving parts of this urban ecosystem, gain knowledge of environmental issues - past and present, and participate in projects to improve their local environment.

SERVICE WHERE IT'S NEEDED

Slough School is dedicated to closing the gap in environmental education opportunities for students in our watershed. Our lessons align with school district learning standards and we prioritize Title I schools, where 40 percent or more of students come from low-income families, when scheduling Slough School lessons.

Over 90 percent of student contacts in 2018-19 qualified for free lunch.

WE HELP A HIDDEN GEM TO SHINE

Our Stewardship program works with local agencies, businesses, and community members to protect, improve, and enhance the Columbia Slough and its watershed. Our Stewardship projects range from weed pulls and tree plantings to trash cleanups and rain garden installations. This year, we removed over 52,000 square feet of weeds and restored 5,400 feet of stream banks.

SUPPORTING LOCAL JOBS AND TRAINING

We partner with green workforce development organizations on a large portion of our projects from design through implementation. In these cases, we collaborate with other nonprofits that mentor, train, and employ low-income or people of color in environmental careers, including habitat enhancement and engineering. This process helps adults gain living-wage jobs and youth acquire skills and connections to prepare them for professions in the environmental sector.


VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT
